



# UNITED FOR UKRAINE'S RECOVERY

The European Union, along with its bank, the European Investment Bank, is collaborating with Ukrainian authorities and UNDP on three recovery programmes focused on rebuilding critical social infrastructure to meet essential needs and ensure decent living conditions for displaced people and their host communities:



The EIB's Ukraine Early Recovery Programme provided support since the 2014 armed conflict began, initially focusing on eastern parts of Ukraine. With the full-scale Russian invasion in 2022, the magnitude of the support increased extensively. Through the recovery programmes, Ukrainian communities can access the financial resources to restore essential social infrastructure, including schools, kindergartens, hospitals, housing, heating and water systems.

The Ministry for Development of Communities and Territories of Ukraine coordinates these programmes together with the Ukraine's Ministry of Finance, while the recovery subprojects are fully managed by local communities. UNDP provides technical assistance, ensuring the effective and efficient implementation of subprojects.

The hospital has changed tremendously! It is completely renovated and now has everything we need. The most important thing is that we can now help more patients daily.

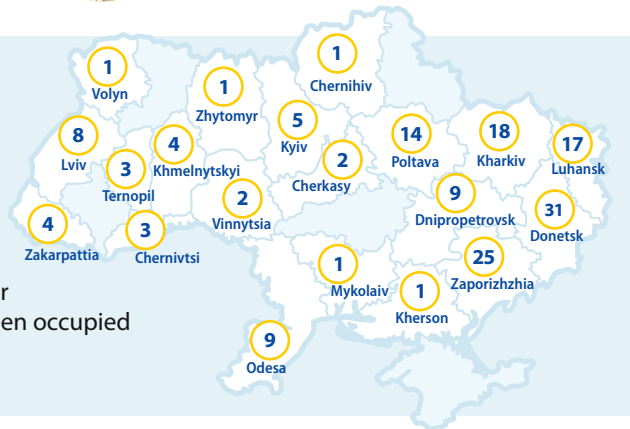

### UERP subprojects | as of December 2024

- Budget — **€200 million**
- **4,9 million people** in total are expected to benefit from **159 subprojects**
- **59** subprojects are underway or planned for reconstruction
- **100** subprojects successfully completed, benefitting **3,9 million people**, including **456 thousand IDPs**, and over 100 subprojects suspended as located in areas that have been occupied or heavily shelled\*
- Launched in **December 2014**

### URP subprojects | as of December 2024

- Budget — **€340 million**
- Over **3 million people** in total are expected to benefit from **156 subprojects**
- **149** subprojects are underway or planned for reconstruction
- **7** subprojects successfully completed, benefitting **53 thousand people**, including **5,188 IDPs**
- Launched in **December 2020**

## UKRAINE RECOVERY PROGRAMME III

- Budget — **€100 million**
- Launched in **June 2024**

In June 2024, a first tranche of EUR 100 million was signed with the government to further support the restoration of social infrastructure and essential services. As with previous programmes, EIB provides long-term funding and expertise. Ukrainian communities can apply for subventions to rebuild social housing, critical infrastructure (heating, water supply and sewerage), healthcare facilities with priority given to de-occupied territories, areas close to conflict zones, and regions with large numbers of internally displaced people. An additional €150 million has also been approved by the EIB and is expected to be signed in the coming months.

**A TOTAL OF 105 SCHOOLS, HOSPITALS, AND PUBLIC BUILDINGS HAVE BEEN RESTORED, WITH 210 SUBPROJECTS UNDERWAY ACROSS 120 COMMUNITIES**



## THE TOLL OF WAR\*



Since the start of the full-scale Russian invasion in 2022, more than **100** facilities previously reconstructed under the programmes have been damaged or destroyed, particularly in areas that were occupied or heavily shelled.

## FINANCING AND IMPLEMENTING PARTNERS



The three recovery programmes, totaling €640 million, are framework loans provided to the government of Ukraine by the **European Investment Bank (EIB)**, the financial arm of the European Union.



These loans are complemented by **€15 million in EU grants** to support programmes implementation.



The **Ministry for Development of Communities and Territories of Ukraine**, jointly with the **Ministry of Finance**, coordinates and oversees the implementation of the programmes, while **local authorities and self-governments** are responsible for fully managing recovery subprojects.



The **United Nations Development Programme (UNDP) in Ukraine** provides technical assistance to Ukrainian communities in implementing recovery subprojects on the ground along with independent monitoring to ensure transparency and accountability.
